Project Budget: \$250,000

Eligibility Requirements

To be eligible to apply, artists <u>must</u>:

- Be over 18
- Live in the United States

Artists living in central Indiana or with a strong personal connection to the Near Eastside neighborhoods in Indianapolis are particularly urged to apply.

Additional desired (*but not required*) qualifications: artists with one or more of these qualifications will receive priority consideration

- Previous commissioned mosaic work
- Previous work integrating public art into new construction projects
- A strong personal connection to the mission of the Damien Center and/or its client base
- Alignment with the Damien Center's values

About Damien Center

Damien Center is Indiana's oldest and largest AIDS service organization (ASO) and serves more than 6,500 individuals affected by HIV/AIDS through a comprehensive, innovative approach to HIV care and prevention. Though established at a time when HIV progressed quickly to AIDS and then death, Damien Center today empowers those living with HIV to thrive while working in our community to remove the stigma associated with an HIV diagnosis. Damien Center's core mission is to be a trusted partner in providing services, education, and advocacy for all people living with or at risk for HIV and any person seeking a safe and welcoming home for care.

Damien Center provides services to more than 25% of all individuals living with HIV in the state. By making a wide variety of programs and services available in-house, we are a one-stop shop caring for those affected by HIV and preventing its spread. We work to reduce HIV infections and provide care to those living with HIV to eliminate their ability to spread the virus. Services provided include information resources, direct medical care, pharmacy supplies, behavioral health care, HIV testing, and wraparound support such as a food pantry, housing assistance, employment assistance, and services for youth and families.

Project Overview

The <u>Indy Arts Council</u> and <u>Damien Center</u> are partnering on commissioning art for Damien Center's new facility, including a mosaic tile project and three mural projects.

The new facility is currently under construction and is located adjacent to its existing building. The facility will include a larger clinic with multiple exam rooms, new dental and vision services, an in-house lab, and an expanded food pantry and pharmacy. The new space will also allow the expansion of youth programming, housing services, prevention programs, and harm reduction programs, and will enable the introduction of new programs and services. The current facility will remain in use after the new facility opens, scheduled for the fall of 2024. For more information, visit http://damienonehome.org

Site Information

The site for the mosaic project is an open, three-story elevator core, visible through the glass front window of the new facility and completely wrapping three sides. The fourth side has the elevator door openings, but the area around the openings is available for treatment.

The surface area available for the mosaic artwork is approximately 1,700 square feet. Artists will have the opportunity to influence the substrate for the mosaic treatment in accordance with their vision and practice.

Theme/Aesthetic Information

- The visual inspiration for the mosaic is the <u>AIDS Memorial Quilt</u>, in the sense that it should have a DIY/activist feel with plenty of visual interest across and around the mosaic surface
- The artwork should be a highly personal tribute to the strength and diversity of the community of people living with AIDS
- A mix of materials—for example, the use of glass, ceramic, and mirror tile as well as embedded objects and other durable materials—may be desirable if it's cost-feasible
- Overall, the artwork design should maintain a positive tone in content and style

The commissioned artist/team is expected to further engage with the Damien Center community to learn more and develop a design for approval.

It is up to the artist to determine whether engaging Damien Center clients in physically fabricating the work is part of their vision. It is not a requirement for this project.

Compensation

The artist fee for the project is \$250,000. The commissioned artist/team is expected to use this fee for project design and administration, any desired community engagement, their fabrication and installation labor on the project, any subcontracted labor, and the materials and equipment they need to execute the project including any lifts or scaffolding. The artist/team will also be required to provide a one-year warranty for the artwork. Contracts will be executed with Damien Center.

Selection Process

Applications will be reviewed by a committee including representatives from the Arts Council, Damien Center, Damien Center stakeholders and clients, and independent artists, arts educators and curators from Indianapolis and beyond. Two or three artists/teams will be recommended as finalists, to be compensated \$500 each to develop a design concept. One finalist artist/team will be recommended for commissioning. The selected artist/team will work further with Damien Center to engage with their as proposed and finalize an artwork design. When the design is approved, the artist will proceed with fabrication and installation as proposed.

Note: While this is the intended selection process, in the event of an insufficient number of qualified applicants the Indy Arts Council and Damien Center reserve the right to change the process to a Request for Proposals, to invite an artist to propose, or to directly select an artist or artwork; and also reserve the right to cancel the opportunity entirely at any point and for any reason, as the best interests of the project may dictate.

Selection Criteria

Finalist artists/teams will be identified for this project based on the following:

- Artistic quality: artist/team's past work is innovative, creative, and stylistically distinctive
- Aesthetic sensibility: artist/team's past work indicates that they can meet the design goals of this project
- **Technical ability**: artist/team's past work indicates they have used materials and techniques similar to those that would be needed for this project, or they have access to the technical resources needed to achieve the desired results
- **Experience**: artist/team is familiar with communities and conditions similar to those that would be encountered on this project, or has demonstrated the ability on past projects to quickly acquire the skills needed to be successful on a project similar to this one
- Process: artist/team's application shows that they are a good communicator, can deliver projects on time and on budget, and can complete documentation in time to keep the project moving smoothly

What to Provide

No designs are required as part of the artist's application materials!

Applicant artists/teams must provide the following information digitally using this application form. A complete application consists of ALL of items 1, 2, 3, and 4. Incomplete applications will not be reviewed.

The process requires registering for a free account to the Arts Council's application platform. If you do not already have an account you will be prompted to register for one using a preferred email address. If you do not have an email address, please contact the Arts Council at (317) 631-3301 x215 and we will assist you in setting up a free email account and show you how to

use it. Once registered, check your email account for confirmation (sometimes it will go into a spam folder, so check that too!) and then log in to view the application form.

- 1. Applicant Information: Provide the lead artist's name, address, phone number(s), email address(es), and, if desired or applicable, website address and/or professional social media accounts. If you plan to develop this project with a team, include the names of your other team members. Indicate also if you have a connection to the HIV epidemic, Damien Center, its community, or the neighborhood it is located within.
- 2. **Artist biography and experience:** Type or copy/paste your bio and experience into the form, or you may choose to attach a resume, narrative biography, or CV. Typed information has a maximum of 5000 characters. Attached documents should be no longer than 2 typed pages and should be provided in DOC, DOCX or PDF format.

<u>APPLICATION TIP</u>: Make sure your statement of experience addresses the needs of the project as they have been outlined in this document, and how you meet the required and desired qualifications.

3. Samples of Previous Work: Images and Information

- a. <u>Provide images of past artwork</u> (*minimum 1, maximum 10 images* including alternate views or details of the same artwork)
 - i. Images can be provided in one or more of the following ways:
 - 1. URL(s) for a website(s) that has images of your work and/or individual project images and information
 - **Please note**: even if you provide a URL for your website, you must attach at least **one** image or document illustrating your style!
 - 2. Single PDF or DOC/DOCX file containing multiple images/projects (with images and descriptions)
 - 3. Individual images or video files up to 10 MB each (JPEG, PNG, PDF and a variety of video formats)
 - 4. Individual documents (PDF, DOC/DOCX) for each project with images and descriptions
 - ii. Uploaded images must be digital, minimum size 4" x 6", and minimum resolution of 72 dpi.
- iii. <u>Videos over 10 MB should not be uploaded through the form</u>. To show videos, please upload a DOC, DOCX or PDF document with live links (for example, to videos on your website, YouTube, Vimeo, etc.), or add the link URLs directly into the form.
- iv. Provide samples that best represent your experience, style, and ability <u>as</u> <u>they apply to this project</u>. This project is for a large-scale mosaic tile installation for an interior location.
- v. You may also provide images of any other work (large-scale or otherwise) that best represents your style and production over the past 5 years.

For best consideration, all images should be professional quality. If you need a referral to a professional photographer who specializes in working with artists, please ask Kate. More tips for best consideration will be provided at the <u>application</u> workshop.

- b. Provide **information** about the projects documented in the images (typed or provided digitally in .txt, .doc, .docx, .xls, .xlsx or .pdf format)
 - i. You may choose to type information directly into the form, or you may choose to attach a document with the information typed out. (please contact <u>kateo@indyarts.org</u> if you need support or pointers for how/where you can type a list out free of charge)
 - ii. If you can, provide direct links to web pages that provide both images and information about individual projects
- iii. Provide as much information as possible about each of the projects; for example:
 - 1. the name/title of piece
 - 2. the client if applicable
 - 3. the location of the piece, if it is site-attached
 - 4. the medium or material of the piece
 - 5. the dimensions of the piece
 - 6. any important process information (how it was made)
 - 7. the project budget or sale price
 - 8. if applicable, a description of the concept or site challenge along with how you solved it
- iv. If you choose to attach a document, make sure your name and contact information appears at the top
- 4. **Demographic information**: To help us keep our programs and services equitable, the final section of the application asks for personal demographic information about the applicant artist/team. It is required, but there is a "prefer not to say" option for each question. We may report this information internally or externally for accountability purposes, but it will be reported in the aggregate without personally identifying information. We encourage you to complete the section honestly.

How to Apply

- Use the application form <u>located here</u>. The form is accessible across a range of platforms and devices, including on a cell phone.
